



CHILDREN IN CONFLICT

We are now witnessing the highest levels of displacement on record. One in nine children now live in conflict areas. In times of disaster, children are particularly vulnerable.

CHILDREN IN CONFLICT LOSE EVERYTHING.

Our disaster response work focuses on children's urgent needs, such as food and water. We then prioritise child protection and education, to help re-establish a sense of security and normality.

SYRIAN REFUGEES IN JORDAN AND EGYPT

Humanitarian needs in Syria and the region have increased significantly since the beginning of the crisis, with 12.2 million people in need of humanitarian assistance, including more than 5.6 million children.

As of September 2016, there are close to 4.8 million Syrian refugees hosted in Turkey, Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq and Egypt.

ALMOST 53% OF THEM ARE CHILDREN.

EGYPT

Growing numbers of Europe-bound migrants are still turning to Egypt as a departure point for their perilous sea journey. In the first 6 months of 2016, at least 7000 migrants and asylum seekers have crossed to Europe from Egypt

IN EGYPT THERE ARE 119,665 REGISTERED REFUGEES.

The deteriorating economic situation in Egypt, coupled with inflation, devaluation of the Egyptian Pound, and the increased joblessness have exerted greater social and economic stresses on the refugees and their host communities in the country.

We are reaching almost 7000 Syrian refugee and host Egyptian children and adults through support from the European Union with interventions in the areas of education, child protection, shelter, hygiene and sanitation, livelihoods and psychosocial support in Damietta, Obour and Qalubia.

JORDAN

Living conditions for refugees are very difficult in Jordan. Often there is limited access to basic resources such as food and water. With over 75 per cent of the population estimated to be women and children;

THEY DESPERATELY NEED ASSISTANCE AND SUPPORT.

We set up operations in Jordan in August 2016. Our programming is focussed on education with day-care facilities serving 300 Syrian and Jordanian children in Mafraq that will provide early childhood activities, parenting support, training for teachers and educational material.

LAKE CHAD AND BOKO HARAM

Years of violence by Boko Haram in Africa's Lake Chad basin have led to a worsening humanitarian crisis and entire families have been forced from their homes to save their lives.

Millions of people, mainly women and children, have been forced to flee their homes in Nigeria to escape violent, religious fundamentalists.

One in three people in the region is a displaced person.

THEY ARE FLEEING FOR THEIR LIVES.

They have lost their homes and their livelihoods.

Children have been pulled from the education system, and every day that this crisis continues is another day where their futures get dimmer.

Plan International is on the ground. We're in the refugee camps, in Cameroon, Niger and Chad providing education and improved child protection for children as well as improving water and sanitation for families to stop the spread of disease.

NIGERIA AND BOKO HARAM

In Nigeria Violent attacks on civilians by the Islamist militant group Boko Haram has left widespread devastation in the Northeast.

MORE THAN 2.6 MILLION PEOPLE HAVE BEEN DISPLACED.

Over 230,000 people are seeking refuge in neighbouring countries such as Cameroon and Niger.

We provide child friendly spaces, where girls and children displaced by the crisis can come together in a safe environment, supervised by trained facilitators.

We also provide desperately needed commodities such as clothes, soaps, food stuffs, and shelter materials to help families stabilize and regain dignity.

HAITI- HURRICANE MATHEW

Plan International assists up to 25,000 families in Haiti hit by Hurricane Matthew, the strongest Caribbean storm in a decade.

The most powerful hurricane in almost a decade, caused widespread devastation in the country's south-west

IT HAS LEFT THOUSANDS DISPLACED – INCLUDING CHILDREN.

After the hurricane, we focused on non-food items, water, sanitation and hygiene and child protection among other areas of need.
